Front and center in my mind as the urgent issue is the proposed legislation, Bill C-7, to increase access to Medical Assistance in Dying.

The bill has only passed First Reading, so has a way to go to be passed.

Given the suspension of parliament until April 20 because of COVID-19, there is still time to voice your concern and objections to expanding MAiD.

Euthanasia Prevention Coalition has created a petition to oppose euthanasia for incompetent people, for mental illness and to oppose eliminating the waiting period: https://citizengo.org/en/177328-reject-bill-c-7

The petition will be sent to the Minister of Justice in Ottawa.

Environment

Continued Care for our Common Home requires vigilance in many aspects of our lives. As far as shopping goes, these are things to consider, along with the price of an item:

- Does this item have excessive packaging are there alternatives with less packaging, such as bulk buying using your own containers?
- Where has this item come from are there alternatives that are more local, therefore with less travel involved in arriving at your door?
- Do I really need this item? Are the alternatives that I could use (or re-use, or repair) to avoid purchasing this?
- For appliances, large and small, is this item as energy-efficient as possible?
 Sometimes, purchasing a quality product saves money in the long run, if it lasts longer, or is of better quality.
- Is this item healthy for you i.e. less processed food, less hazardous cleaning products, not 'disposable' even it is carries that label?

Yes, there are many factors that can be considered in purchasing something, from groceries to big ticket items. Not an easy task, for sure!

USED STAMPS TO HELP DEVELOPMENT AND PEACE

Did you know that used stamps can help raise funds for countries who are suffering in the Global South? The collection and sale of stamps started in 1984, before e-mail and faxes, when most communications were sent by mail. In the early years, approximately \$1000.00 was raised annually. Now this country wide fundraiser makes an average of \$30,000.00 per year for Development and Peace. The monies raised support agriculture, education and human rights programs in seventy countries in the Global South. Members of the Catholic Women's League of Canada are big supporters of this initiative. In our region of North Bay, member Shirley Marcotte has made it her goal to collect, sort and mail used stamps to the Montreal Office of the Canadian Catholic Organization for Development and Peace. Once these stamps are received in Montreal, they are sold at auction for pennies, but a few have sold for as much as \$40.00.

In our parish of St. Peter the Apostle Church in North Bay, a special box is always placed at the back of the church and Shirley empties it on a regular basis. She accumulates the stamps and mails them out periodically. The picture shows only a portion of the many bags filled with stamps.

Please feel free to send your stamps directly to Development and Peace or organize your own collection box. A used stamp isn't worth much but many stamps can make a difference in peoples' lives.

These weekly sessions are a form of socializing alleviate to loneliness, of learning new skills and of increasing self-



esteem which ties in with promoting individual health and well-being.

As one can see our group has been busy. To date we created and have given out the following - 115 large afghans, 160 lap afghans, 128 shawls, 53 pairs of Knitted Knockers, 24 pairs of socks, 35 crocheted angels, 596 baby toques, 33 adult toques, 9 pairs of slippers and 1 neck warmer.

In the past year we have also had raffles and sales of our creations to raise money for our parish church roof repair fund. These will always be a part of the contributions from our members.

We will remain open to the needs of any other projects where we can share our talents.



Feeding the Hungry. Some of the CWL members as well as many local citizens volunteer a great part of their time helping those less fortunate. On a busy month, we serve approximately 120 or more individuals, which can amount to two or three hundred people. The clients are greeted with beverages and snacks, before being interviewed and shown different ways to prepare healthy meals to fit within their budget. Once they have chosen and received all their food, they can take advantage of a free ride home that one of our local taxi provides for them.

National Strategic Plan

LOOKING BACK AND LOOKING FORWARD - National Strategic Plan Update

"Be bold, speak out, have courage, leave your mark! Do not be afraid, shine like a bright torch in the dark. Point the way to Christ, follow where he leads, live as a joyful disciple, on your mission, you will succeed!

Do justice, create hope. Be Christs' hands and feet. Put your faith in action serve everyone you meet.

It has been about a year and a half since the journey began to implement the Strategic Plan. It started with four women of the Implementation Committee and has blossomed into a multitude of women responding to the call for change. In the fall, we were pleased to present the Strategic Plan update at each Regional Meeting. This past year, there have been many highlights which I am excited to share with you now:

Goal 1 - Marketing & Reorganization the League Working Groups by Lisa Henry, Goal 1 Lead

Marketing Working Group – Cathy McKinney, Connie Crichton, Kathy Dahl, Lisa Fillingham, Christa Grillmair, Jessie Parkinson and Terry Mae Sinclair

This charismatic group has conducted an incredible amount of research to provide a comprehensive package of information to a marketing agency. Information such as defining marketing goals, what is working well and not working well, sources of apathy, what



makes the League unique, identifying a target audience, strengths and weaknesses, etc. A branding review has been conducted, and the group is currently working on developing a "big idea" that captures the essence of this beloved organization.

Additionally, the working group researched potential marketing agencies, developed a Request for Proposal (RFP), distributed the RFP to agencies selected through a strict review and assessment process, and formed a selection committee led by Sr. Susan Scott to interview and assess the agencies. Using the comprehensive grading criteria, a recommendation of a marketing agency to work with the League in this capacity was made. Currently, a contract is being reviewed by both the League and the marketing agency. Once this step is complete, the name of the selected agency will be shared.

Reorganization Working Group (Broken down into 3 Sub-Committees) — Linda Squarzolo, Jean Ashdown, Marilyn Blew, Margot de la Gorgendiere, Barbara Dowding, Irene Gallant, Nelly Kelders, Sue Lubowitz, Christine Mason, Mary Lou Watson

This group of dynamic women have also worked tremendously hard and accomplished so much given its mandates and the scope of responsibilities. There are three sub-committees within the reorganization working group, and each has produced an impressive amount of research and information.

Sub-committee #1 (Linda Squarzolo, Sue Lubowitz and Christine Mason) is responsible for reviewing existing standing committees and consolidating them to three standing committees to align with the core values of faith, service and social justice. The work involved examining existing committees and assessing what was effective and why, what committee work is reasonable and attainable by members, what is not working well or no longer relevant, and evaluating what work will transition into the three new standing committees. This has involved a lot of review and research. The sub-committee is distilling the research and information to ensure the goals and objectives are being met.

Sub-committee #2 (Marilyn Blew, Jean Ashdown, Margot de la Gorgendiere and Barbara Dowding) is responsible for examining the current levels of the League, streamlining executive offices and creating distinctive roles for each level. No small task to be sure! These particular tasks have been quite an undertaking with an incredible amount of time and effort invested into ensuring it captures the intent and spirit of the strategies. To date, the sub-committee has reviewed the League's current structure and conducted a comparison of similar organizations and governance models to evaluate if there would be a model suitable for the League's purposes. An interview process was developed with a goal of diocesan and provincial presidents gathering research to support a thorough examination of the levels. There is much more work to complete to feel confident about the recommendations that will arise from the fruit of its efforts.

Sub-committee #3 (Irene Gallant, Nelly Kelders and Mary Lou Watson) is responsible for simplifying procedures and reporting processes. The subcommittee conducted current meeting procedures and reporting processes, researched and identified best practices for streamlining procedures and developed and distributed a survey to members to gather research to support the efforts. Currently, the sub-committee is distilling data from the survey and will use it in future recommendations.

Goal 4 – Affirmation Working Group By Sharon Ciebin, Goal 4 Lead

"For surely I know the plans I have for you, says the Lord, plans for your welfare and not for harm, to give you a future with hope" (Jeremiah 29:11).

What a pleasure it is to share a second update on the affirmation working group's progress! Seven women from across Canada continue to trust the Lord and have the

utmost faith and hope that He will guide their efforts as new processes for a welcoming, inclusive and affirming environment are created. These members have continued to research groups and resources. While all materials have provided beneficial information to the overall plan, the overwhelming responses received from parish council presidents on best practices and member engagement has been both a lesson in the faith of members and a humbling experience for us all.
