POSSIBLE CHANGES TO REDUCE CONSUMPTION OF WATER

(Run water you are going to use for a particular purpose into a container for a minute to estimate your savings per minute – make sure you use the water and don't just dump it ① .. then use the calculation per minute X # of minutes of activity X # times activity done per day or week X days or weeks in a year and then convert to calculate your total annual savings in litres/gallons)

- Turn off the tap while brushing your teeth
- Turn off the tap while you scrub your hands
- <u>3</u> Operate dishwasher and washer only when full (each cycle uses 4-6 gallons .. how many cycles do you save per week then x 52 for per year)
- 4 Fix a leaky faucet (estimated savings 30-40 gallons per week with a steady run)
- Shorten # of minutes for each shower (estimated savings 2.1 gallons per minute)
- 6 Fill a pitcher with water and store in fridge so do not run water to cool
- Do not let the water run continuously to rinse dishes
- 8 If washing dishes, put water in the sink rather than letting the tap run while washing
- Use biodegradable dish soap and then use dishwater for watering plants after completing dishwashing (reusing water also counts as a savings)
- 10 Collect rain water and/or melt snow to water plants

To all Ontario members,

It is my honour to be representing you as provincial president.

The Catholic Women's League taught me the importance of prayer and showed me the unexplainable power of the rosary. That is the reason I have chosen the rosary as the symbol for my signatures and messages. I use the rosary daily to ask Our Lady to help me open my heart and mind to the things that the Holy Spirit is trying to tell me. Joining the Catholic Women's League in 2003 put me on a path to the best spiritual development I could ever imagine. I want to share that passion for prayer with you. I ask that you pray the rosary as often as you can. Keep all members in your prayers as we strive for increased faith development, undying commitment to service and social justice for all.

While considering the goal of my term I quickly realized that I did not want to lose the momentum gained from Anne's focus on homelessness. How could we continue to support those most vulnerable and yet grow in our understanding of their circumstances? I attended an advent retreat in Ottawa where I heard Fr. Mark Slatter talk about "Homelessness and the Holy Family". In his talk he mentioned loneliness and the different types of loneliness. The words caught my ear and the Holy Spirit took hold. **Loneliness** will be our focus for this term.

There are initiatives all over the world to alleviate loneliness. In the United Kingdom a police officer who was investigating a fraud case found the success of the fraud was accelerated by the victim's loneliness. In response to his findings he put a sign up on a park bench to encourage people sitting there to "chat" safely. Another story is from a village in France where a school principal responded to a community senior who "joked" that seniors should be invited to lunch with the school children in the newly renovated school cafeteria. The program is so successful that several other towns are working to implement it. The article states it is a win-win for both students and seniors. Dear Sisters in the League,

It was on the feast of St. Mark, April 25, 1467, a woman ran out of money to repair a church at Genazzano, Italy. During the outdoor celebrations, parishioners heard music and noticed that a cloud appeared and began to descend down an unfinished wall of the church. What was left was an image, 40x45 cm, of the Virgin Mary holding the child Jesus in her arms.

Devotion to the image grew through increased masses, prayers and prayer services. Several popes made pilgrimages to venerate and pray before the image In 1903, Pope Leo XIII inserted the title of Our Lady of Good Counsel into the Litany of Loretto. In 1923, the Catholic Women's League adopted Our Lady of Good Counsel as its patroness. This icon became a symbol of lay involvement and the responsibility of women to care for the church.

We are Jesus' sisters and mothers. As we do the will of the Father we realize our mission as members of the Catholic Women's League. As sisters in the league, we plan, develop and coordinate programs for Christian fellowship. We encourage the living of Christian values. We plan and support charitable and community activities. We discuss topics of national interest and importance to Church, governments and society. We simply serve in the ministry of Jesus by showing our loving care and compassion for the lonely, elderly, vulnerable and many others.

Mary is honoured under the title of Our Lady of Good Counsel. For she is called, in Isaiah's prophetic vision, "wonderful counselor." (Isaiah 9.5) She lived her life under the counsel of the Holy Spirit's wisdom as she gave herself wholeheartedly to God's wise loving plan.

As we approach the hundredth anniversary of the Catholic Women's League in the diocese, we continue to seek the gift of the Holy Spirit's wisdom through the intercession of Our Lady of Good Counsel. As we look at the image of Mary, we see the child Jesus, whom she is holding, looking up at her. We are drawn as well to look at Mary for her counsel. We reflect on the words in the prayer in honour of our patroness,

"that we may be faithful in our Baptism fervent in prayer and generous in the service we give to our sisters and brothers. May the spirit of the living God who graced you with the gift of counsel lead us in the way of truth and love."

In Sudbury last July we were fortunate to have the film "Unplanned" (the true story of Abby Johnson, a CEO of a Planned Parenthood Clinic who quit her job to become Prolife after being asked to assist with an abortion) shown in Sudbury. It was most informative and needs to be seen, because seeing abortion changes the minds of pro-choice individuals. Also, in Sudbury, The Right To Life Dinner, hosted Doctor Jason Lepoyarvi (an assistant professor of religious studies at Thornloe University), who gave a very informative message on life from the moment of conception and how legislation very easily overcomes some bioethics. The movie "Unplanned" is now on DVD and can be shown to groups. Many areas are pressing school boards to gain permission to show this film. This film **needs** to be seen.

As well as the theme "Care For Our Common Home" (our provincial president, Colleen Perry has asked us to include "Loneliness" for the next two years. There are many things we can do with some brainstorming.

Let us "stay the course", "keep on fighting", so that good things will happen. Let us get involved in local politics. Remember most of all our politicians began on school boards or as councillors or as mayors. Let us change "the culture of death" to "a culture of life".

Some resources I would like to recommend are:

- 1. Campaign Life Coalition provides monthly newsletters.
- 2. (The Interim) is Canada's Life and Family newspaper.
- 3. The catholic register- a must read.
- 4. EWTN (Eternal Word Television Network) a 24-7 day week program. Television is the best medium to promote evangelization.
- 5. (Sharing the Healing and the Hope) 2nd Edition by Missionary oblates of Mary Immaculate (271 prayers) as well as traditional catholic prayers.

It was then sent on to the National Convention for final endorsement. The resolution was presented to the Federal Government and soon thereafter changes were made to create equality for all.

<u>Medical Assistance in Dying – MaiD – Moving Forward?</u>

Here is the legal definition of 'Eligibility for medical assistance in dying": https://laws-lois.justice.gc.ca/eng/AnnualStatutes/2016 3/FullText.html

From January 1 - October 21, 2018, there were 1,211 medically assisted deaths in Ontario.

At our CWL Ontario Provincial Convention, Hazel Markwell suggested the need to have conversations about end of life issues with family and friends. She described the need to acknowledge a person's fear of being a burden.

In his 2019 federal election campaign, Liberal Leader Justin Trudeau said he'll bring in legislation to expand access to medical assistance in dying. He would aim to strike a balance between protecting the most vulnerable people and respecting the rights and choices of Canadians. The Trudeau government commissioned expert panels to look at other areas of assisted death, including advance requests and extending the right to mature minors and people with severe psychiatric disorders. 

Ontario CWL Social Justice Award Recipient - Doris Labelle

In 2019 Doris Labelle was nominated for the Social Justice Award of the Ontario Provincial Council of The Catholic Women's League of Canada. Of the nominees from across the Province of Ontario, Doris, a 58-year League member, was chosen as the recipient.

Doris was born in England and volunteered with the Royal Air Force in 1944, working as secretary for the quartermaster. Her duties included corresponding with families of patients regarding their condition. In 2016 Doris was awarded a Medal of Service for this work, 71 years later.

Doris immigrated to Canada in 1946. When in her 40's, Doris returned to school and graduated from teachers' college in 1971. She embraced her teaching career, making a positive difference in the lives of her students.

Doris has been a strong voice in the pursuit of social justice. She has led in researching resolutions, was an active participant in the Valley East Community Action Network and has consulted with MPP France Gelinas concerning several issues.

She has been an active member of the League, both at her parish and at the diocesan councils, in her parish of St. Kevin's and in her community of Valley East (Val Therese, Val Caron and Hanmer). Despite suffering a stroke in 2015, Doris retains her passion and efforts to advocate for the vulnerable.

Since Doris was unable to attend the provincial convention in Kingston to accept the award, a CWL committee visited her at the Elizabeth Centre to present the award.
