Dear Sisters in Christ,

It is my pleasure to connect with you through this fall newsletter. During the month of November, pray for the deceased members of our families, our friends and our sisters in the league

As we approach year two of the globe's collective experience with the Covid-19 pandemic, it's fair to assume people the world over are asking themselves the same two questions: How will this end? And when? As the members of CWL we have one more question: what did we learn from this?

The learnings on change obtained during this pandemic are a result of action, rather than theories. While testing our limits, 2020 stood out as a master teacher on change responsiveness without preparedness. Change has challenged existing notions about our natural resistance to change. We saw the emergence of a new paradigm around change, highlighting our inner agility, innovative abilities and strength to seize opportunities for speedy personal and organizational transformation in crisis.

To find a solution for this challenge, the Pope's announcements on the year of St. Joseph and the year of family stand as encouraging factors.

The Holy Father wrote Patris corde ("With a Father's Heart") against the backdrop of the Covid-19 pandemic, which, he says, has helped us see more clearly the importance of "ordinary" people who, though far from the limelight, exercise patience and offer hope every day. In this, they resemble Saint Joseph, "the man who goes unnoticed, a daily, discreet and hidden presence," who nonetheless played "an incomparable role in the history of salvation."

In this sense, St. Joseph is "the special patron of all those people who faced changes, especially of all those forced to leave their native lands because of war, hatred, persecution and poverty."

Pope Francis announced the year of Family and invoked the Blessed Mother, "May the Virgin Mary grant that families throughout the world be increasingly fascinated by the evangelical ideal of the Holy Family, so as to become a leaven of [a] new humanity and of a genuine and universal solidarity."

We are to accept the impacts of the current pandemic and follow St. Joseph to strengthen the joy of the family. So, let us support the family! Let us defend it from all that compromises its beauty.

I wish you all a fruitful advent season and a Merry Christmas. God bless you all.

Renewal in the CWL is all around us especially in the hearts and hands of members as they persevere through the challenges of this pandemic, through the gifts shared by working group members who are implementing the strategic plan and the many creative ways councils are meeting and innovating to give back to our local communities. Here are some updates to share:

Recruit Members and Maintain Membership

Now is the time most councils should be talking about membership renewal and new membership drives. Membership is declining and one of the factors for this is lack of renewal. A good reminder for us to keep in mind is that retention of members is as important as recruiting new members. Personal contact is still found to be very effective. If COVID has taught us anything, it is that the human condition thrives on personal contact. Reach out with a friendly phone call, meet someone for coffee, ask them what would be of interest to them or an activity they would be interested in becoming involved in. Do they need spiritual nourishment or a social activity to bring them out? Council and Leadership Development

For many councils, this may be an election year. It can be challenging to fill executive council positions and as changes through the five year strategic plan are being released, especially some on hold until the instructed vote has been completed, we wait with great anticipation.

How do we lead change during these times and find creative ways to function? I invite you to consider the following strategies:

- 1. Take some time to do an evaluation of what the current state of your council is right now. Use the core values of Faith, Service, and Social Justice to categorize your activities.
- 2. Determine activities you want to continue, quit doing, and start doing. Try to balance the columns.
- 3. Not a full executive? Maybe two would share a position. Rotate chairing meetings.
- 4. Consult with all members and your spiritual advisor and make a plan.
- 5. Communicate your changes to your parish.

Annual Reports

By now you have received your annual reporting packages. Please make every effort to report on your activities over the past year. Don't worry if you weren't as active as you normally were because of pandemic conditions. EVERY LITTLE BIT COUNTS and we need to celebrate our collective efforts! Your regional chairpersons are available to assist and so am I! Let's work together to have 100% of councils report!

Legislation Standing Committee

Dear Sisters in the League,

Legislation is social justice in action. It is the carrying out of League resolutions to influence government policy. From the CWL Executive Handbook (May 2014)

It is our role to monitor and study legislation at all levels of government, and to review ongoing and proposed legislation that pertains to League resolutions.

I will highlight two bills that have been put forward in the Ontario Legislature following findings that were brought to the forefront during the pandemic. The entirety of the Bills can be found at www.ola.org-click on "find bills" (or google Ontario legislation). I encourage you to take a few moments and read some of the ones that interest you.

Bill 14, Time to Care Act (Long-Term Care Homes Amendment, Minimum Standards of Daily Care), 2021 Armstrong, Teresa J.

Current status: First Reading Carried

The Bill amends the Long-Term Care Homes Act, 2007 so that so that a long-term care home will have to provide its residents with at least four hours a day of nursing and personal support services, averaged across the residents. The minimum hours may be increased by regulation.

Bill 48, Support Workers Pay Act, 2021.

Current status: First Reading Carried

This Act provides minimum pay for every support worker including the temporary pandemic pay paid to support workers; provides travel payments per kilometre travelled between work sites; stipulates that the Minister of Long-Term Care develop programs to provide training, education and professional development for all support workers and long term care staff; recruit and retain the number of support workers required to deliver adequate and appropriate care; and ensure support workers are paid while learning on the job and that they can receive full-time jobs at the end of their apprenticeship.

As many of us consider travelling somewhere warmer this winter, here are the *current* requirements for returning to Canada after being out of country.

Before leaving Canada, verify that you meet the entry requirements for your destination country: Travel Advice and Advisories - Travel.gc.ca

These are the requirements for fully vaccinated travelers:

COVID-19 vaccinated travellers entering Canada

- Have received at least 2 doses of a Canada-accepted Covid-19 vaccine
- Have received your second dose at least 14 full days prior to the day you enter Canada
- Upload your proof of vaccination in ArriveCAN: ArriveCAN (canada.ca)
- Have no sign or symptoms of Covid-19
- Have an ArriveCAN receipt with letter V or I beside your name
- Get a pre-entry test taken within 72 hours of arrival, or proof of a previous positive molecular test result taken between 14 and 180 days
 - Accepted types of tests: PCR, NAT, NAAT or RT-LAMP
 - Rapid antigen tests aren't accepted
- When you arrive at the border, you must present an accepted negative molecular test result or proof of a previous positive molecular test result taken between 14 and 180 days that includes:
 - o Traveller name and date of birth
 - Name and civic address of the lab/clinic/facility of the test
 - o The date on which the test was conducted
 - The type of test conducted
 - The test results
- Keep proof of your test results for the 14-day period that beings on the day you enter Canada

The good news is that if you meet all of the above requirements, you don't have to quarantine!!!

I hope this little bit of research helps you get on your way! Bon Voyage!!

She represented the Sault Ste. Marie diocesan council on the OPC from 2017 -2019. Over the years she has been blessed to work, pray and play with many wonderful ladies who she feels privileged to call "friends and sisters".



Betsy is very excited to be the legislation chair. She admits it will be a learning experience and a challenge which she welcomes wholeheartedly. She is hopeful that together with the OPC, they will learn more about current provincial legislation and become more involved in whatever social action comes out of it. Her hope is that their excitement becomes contagious with all members and sparks them to write letters and / or call their provincial members of parliament to voice their concerns or suggestions. She prays that God will guide them as they move forward over the next few months.

HELP NEEDED

The Catholic Women's League in the diocese of Sault Ste. Marie is looking for help. A committee was struck in early 2020 to address the needs of the homeless population of the downtown core of North Bay.

I think we are all aware that the opioid crisis and homelessness are very prevalent throughout the diocese. I have asked the region of Sudbury and Sault Ste. Marie to follow the amazing example of The Compassionate Committee for the homeless of North Bay. This group is led by Leah Pierce at the Pro Cathedral of the Assumption. Here is a brief description from North Bay;

The Compassionate Committee for the homeless of North Bay is a conduit between existing supports services and organizations that address the immediate needs of the near homeless and homeless, and the various church parishes and congregations.

I am thrilled to report that, in Sudbury, our group has begun the groundwork for the project! Diane Legault has taken the lead in forming this group. In her latest update she states;

"We are still in the process of gathering information on existing services for our Compassionate Committee for the Homeless of Sudbury. We constantly remind ourselves that we do not want to duplicate any services that are already being provided.

We discovered at our latest visit at the Blue Door Café and Grace Family Outreach, they are the only ones in the downtown core that provide daily meals. In our discussions we were told we can help with donations of hats, scarves, mittens, blankets. Both locations have plans for a Christmas meal and will be handing out Christmas Fun Packs, they suggest we could include a \$5.00 Tim Horton Gift. They have told us that the majority of

homeless are men with 20% women. Staff at the Blue Door suggested we hold a Thermos and Can Opener Drive. At times, the homeless are not able to get to the Blue Door to pick up a meal at the designated times, but they have canned goods from the food bank and many do not have can openers.

Grace Outreach has the same needs; they've included a need for Coffee Mate, sugar; they also need a large stand-up freezer.

We will continue to get in touch with the other churches in the city core to find out what they need. In the meantime, our CWL ladies in the parishes can start with these immediate needs."





I take great pride in saying that as a family both my mother and grandmother were sisters in the league and when I was nominated for a maple leaf service pin, I insisted on using my mother's pin.

Our council has shown both service to God and great charity during this pandemic. The pandemic committee made up of two CWL members, look after all of the contact tracing and sanitizing. It's their good works that make it possible to continue practicing our faith in-person. One of our members delivers 30 bags with water, granola bars etc. to the homeless each month and another delivers a case of coffee to the Samaritan center each month. Per Capita Fee Increase

At the recent national fall meeting there was a reiteration of concerns for the need to increase national per capita fees. The following is a fact sheet prepared by National Secretary-Treasurer Marie Rackley.

FACTS:

- 1. It has been 10 years since the last increase National per capita fee increase.
- 2. 8 out of the past 10 years we have had an operating deficit.
- 3. Investment income and sale of investments have covered out operating deficit.
- 4. Increase in expenses have continued to affect our deficit: facility costs, supplies, conventions, travel, salaries, league promotion magazine cost.
- 5. Decrease in membership over the last 3 years has been close to 12,000 for a variety of reasons.
- 6. Covid has made its mark on our League by distancing our members from one other but also from our parish, diocesan, and national councils.
- 7. The younger generation of Catholics are frustrated and upset with the church today and are not playing an active role in our church community.

Solutions

- In 2017 2018 talks began to develop a Strategic Plan to revise and change the format of the Catholic Women's League of Canada. Motion was made to invest \$1,000,000 from the investments fund to cover this 5-year project. This would not affect the financial operation of the League
- 2. It is time for the League to invest in its membership at all levels. The Welcome Program was developed and needs to be promoted with the parish councils through the leadership of the Provincial Presidents. It is time for the National Executive to invest in their Provincial Counterparts so that they are informed of all information and changes and can pass it along to the Diocesan counterparts
- 3. The Board of Directors have already started to make the tough decisions and look at conserving expenses. The reduction of two printed copies of our League magazine and it is time to make another tough decision by having a in person National Convention every other year and having a virtual National convention the opposite year
- 4. Support is needed from our Spiritual Advisors. It is time for the Bishops in the various dioceses in the provinces to reach out and support the League by speaking to their parish pastors and asking them to be part of our great organization. We need to invite the ladies from our church community with our Parish Priest standing next to our Parish / Provincial President. We need to show that we are a strong spiritual organization rooted in gospel values and support God's



people. We the Catholic Women's League of Canada play a vital role in the Catholic church as confirmed by the Canadian Conference of Catholic Bishops.

- 5. Expenses can be reduced but not affect the operations of an efficient office.
- 6. There is only one place to look and that is to increase revenue. The solution is per capita fees. The \$12 increase on 65,000 members would give us \$78,000 extra in fees for 2023. With this increase we would be able to:
 - a. Begin returning to investments the dollars that we have used to operate the league.
 - b. Continue to invest in leadership training within each province.
 - c. Encourage our Board to reach out to their counter parts within the provinces and have virtual meetings.
 - d. Increase grants to the provinces for provincial workshops.
 - e. Could we return to 3 copies of our magazine?

Responsibility

This is our responsibility, the Board members of the League, to provide the information to our members on why we need an increase in per capita fees. What is negative must become positive. We accepted this responsibility when we offered our name to service on National level and were elected by the membership to service and protect our League. There are ways we can work together to help with the \$12.00 increase, as was conveyed in my Communique.

We as a Board have to "Walk the Talk"

How can we walk away from the League who has given us a voice in our Church, a voice with the Canadian Conference of Catholic Bishops, a voice with the Federal government through our Resolutions, a voice with WUCWO (World Union of Catholic Women's Organization) and a voice to express our concerns in developing Countries?

Our new theme says it all "Catholic and Living It"
