

SOCIAL JUSTICE

On Sunday, May 7th, The Catholic Women's League of Canada Diocese of Sault Ste Marie, sponsored a presentation of The Reconciliation Tapestry presented by Jackie Hookimaw-Witt and Norbert Witt at the Anishinabe Spiritual Centre in Espanola. The event was organized by People of Hope Seeking Reconciliation who are made up of Indigenous and non-indigenous Catholic Women.

Jackie and Norbert are educators of the indigenous story, who are also Catholic, and have created a beautiful tapestry together with children from Attawapiskat with the hope of cultivating healing and dialogue between cultures. The tapestry was also developed as a teaching tool for younger children, dealing with the trauma of residential school, with the children being active in putting the story together, gluing felt figures and images on the textile banner.

The tapestry depicts three time periods: Before Contact, Stolen Children and A New Beginning.

Throughout the day, attendees were invited to reflect, share their stories, take part in a small creative activity and open a wider dialogue in the spirit of truth and reconciliation. The day ended with a Sharing Circle, a time of sacredness and holding one another in deep respect.

Our sincere thanks go out to Mary O'Donnell (Group Lead), Sr. Priscilla Solomon, all members of People of Hope Seeking Reconciliation, and most especially to Jackie Hookimaw-Witt and Norbert Witt for bringing people together to dialogue, to help us to Walk Together in a Good Way.

We first saw this tapestry and presentation at our 102nd Diocesan Convention in 2022. It is a powerful depiction of the injustices that the Indigenous peoples of Canada have faced. We pray that Jackie and Norbert's work can enable healing and reconciliation. God bless them in their efforts!

A Quebec department store, Simons, was promoting Medical Assistance in Dying in its advertisements. After a month the ad was removed due to the backlash from people like you. Quebec wants to expand MAiD to include infants. There are people that are applying for MAiD who simply cannot afford appropriate housing. Now the federal government wants to include those suffering mentally. It's cheaper to kill someone than to help someone. We all must do what we can to prevent this from happening. Write to your MP in support of Bill C-314 which will prevent MAiD to be expanded to include the mentally ill. MAiD is murder no matter how it's spun. MAiD, in my opinion, is to avoid or replace palliative care.

Human life is precious. We are all created in God's image. Our souls are created the moment an egg is fertilized. When a baby is formed. Let us strive to protect the dignity of life for all.

Canadian Conference of Catholic Bishops has a palliative care program available to all called Horizons of Hope. There is the Euthanasia Prevention Coalition. Please sign up for emails at epcc.ca. While at their website you can learn about bills brought to our government, how euthanasia is spreading throughout the world and how to get help.

Convention Highlights

147 registered for the convention. Our meeting emphasis – faith, sisterhood and fun as we serve.

Bishop Dowd said there is a crisis of loss of hope in the western world. Our diocesan challenge is to "Get down in the Weeds". Bishop Thomas has a degree in economics so numbers are important to him. On the last census, there were 380,000+ people in the diocese, 40.1% identified as Catholic, 35.8% as no religious affiliation, 21.3% as other Christian denominations, and 2.8% as non-Christian. Only 10% of Catholics attend Mass, but even those with no affiliation believe in a higher power. He mentioned many of the things Jesus did on earth – preaching, healing the sick, forgiving sins, raising the dead, initiating the Eucharist, honouring Mary, dying and rising from the dead. We must flesh these out (except for raising the dead). Our mission is to bring people to the fullness of life by the Holy Spirit through our relationship with Jesus as we show it in serving one another.

Sister Bonnie McLellan, General Superior of the Sisters of St. Joseph, said they have 67 sisters left in their congregation, with an average age of 82. She wants us to look at reality through the eyes of faith. Live our faith in good and gad. God will never leave us. The world should be seen through the eyes of hope. Hope helps us to see outside ourselves to the needy. The Pope's words "Women keep our faith alive." Sister said "God kisses every soul before it enters the body and every body spends the rest of it's life looking for the source of that kiss. Faith is seeing light in the darkness. She recommended a book "Graced Crosswords".

Fr. Pat Woods, our Diocesan Spiritual Director said we should stop and reflect – life happens. Our direction is from Christ, find Him and find our direction. Recognize how blessed we are. Do not be afraid of change – Trust in God.

Betty Colaneri, National 1st Vice-President and Communications Chair reported that happiness is outwards – Joy is inner self, inner contentment. Joy is a choice. She then talked about what makes a good leader – vision, good listener, setting an example, uses power ethically, seeks consensus. She finished with an observation that her family runs a winery and during the pandemic they thought they would have to shut down, but the government decided they were an essential service!

Helpful Information to assist with Directives, Communiques and New Executive Structure

As we go forward this year, many of you will be holding elections and some have asked that with the standing committees being reduced to three, how will all the work be addressed by fewer officers? "A committee is defined as a group of people appointed for a specific function, typically consisting of members of a larger group".

We encourage all committee chairs to form a committee within their respective roles. For example, your Faith Chairperson can ask a few people to be on her committee and assist her with developing spiritual programs throughout the year. The same would apply for both the Service and Social Justice Chairpersons. It is a wonderful way to include members who have gifts in these areas and can assist us on these committees. We are not meant to be a committee of one and these gifted women can help the committee chairs and not have to attend executive meetings. It's a great succession planning model in the event they want to transition to a chair position one day.
